To our great delight we heard the story of these three lovely ladies.

Madeline Kay Field, Queen, a student at Salt Lake Community College, lived in Australia, and served a mission in Tucson, Arizona. She told us about participating as a youth in a Pioneer Trek and doing the women's pull, then about one of her ancestors who as a little girl left her doll behind on the trail and could not stop crying over the loss. At the end of the day her father asked what was the matter, returned on horseback to look for it, and returned to camp with it to console his little girl.

Christina Muhlestein, the First Attendant to the Queen, was a missionary in Flagstaff, Arizona, is studying Chemical Engineering at BYU. Her story was of her ancestor from Switzerland who was a watch maker, but on coming west found no need for that so he became a farmer and eventually went into the dairy business in Provo, establishing the predecessor of the BYU Creamery on 7th East, which she now enjoys.

Kaitlin Paxton, the Second Attendant to the Queen, studies neuroscience at the University of Utah, served a mission in Knoxville, Tennessee, and inherits "feistiness" from her Danish ancestor who joined the church and immigrated to Utah, in which company was her future husband, also from Denmark. The church asked him to work on many projects keeping him away from home often. Once as he left he paid his tithing with their only two cows, which after he was gone, his wife went to the tithing yard, retrieved one of them, and said if the church needed him to be gone and the family needed to survive then they needed this cow, and, she said, I am sure the Lord will agree with me.

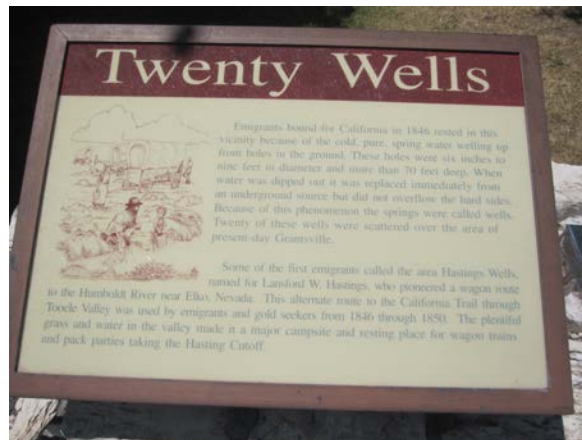
