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"Mormon Money" presented by Hank Thompson on April 2, 2015

Chris Christensen wrote and asked Hank for a short biography to help introduce him to the members and guests of our Chapter, when he speaks to us on April 2nd. Here it is.

Name: Hank Thompson

Place of birth: Heber City, Utah.

Where Did you grow up? Heber City until I was 12 years old then we moved around Utah working on dairy farms in Orem, Lehi and Duchesne, and in 1969 (at the age of 15) we moved to Grantsville, which has been home ever since. I married a "Grantsvilleite" in 1974 and we have 4 children (3 girls and a boy), and eleven grandchildren with another on the way in May.

What occupations have you had? I was with the U.S. Government for over thirty seven years retiring on 31 January 2011. Twenty five years were in Chemical Weapons Demilitarization, with thirteen of those on Johnston Island (about 700 miles SW of Hawaii). For the past two plus years I have been a handyman on LDS chapels in Tooele, Holiday and West Valley City.

Education: Graduate of Grantsville High School.

Hobbies: Grandchildren, Yard work, Woodworking, Coin Collecting, but my main hobby is tinkering in my shop, making sawdust and bending nails.

Interests: Church History and of course old money, both United States and Mormon Money. I joined the SUP Twenty Wells Chapter in 2006 and have held most board positions including President in 2011 and currently am the Chapter Historian.

Travel: I have been to 40 States, but never outside the United States.

How did you develop an interest in your topic? I was interested in coins as a kid, but never had much of a collection to speak of. Most times I just spent money, and in 2000 when my wife and I became empty nesters, finally I had a few dollars left over at the end of each payday.

What have you learned as a result of your research into your subject? That the pioneers' hardships were a lot of the same as ours when it came to economics, that is they were worried about inflation and where their next dollar or meal would come from if they didn't work, the same as for us today.

What are you hoping we will learn from attending your lecture? Perhaps a little better understanding of how the early pioneers made do with what they had and if they needed something then it was worth praying and working for it.

I'm mostly just looking for a good way to introduce you. Easy: A small town boy who has a passion for pioneer lore and old things.

On March 5th Explorer George Potter spoke to our members and guests (about 75 people). George works in Saudi Arabia and for many years has been involved in the Nephi Project which has focused on discovering the trail Lehi's family followed after they left Jerusalem until they left the Arabian peninsula by ship and sailed to the new world. George briefly introduced his topic then showed a film introducing us to Arabia, one of many films and books he and his colleagues have produced over several years.

We were pleasantly entertained and pleased with the information he presented, having gained, obviously, much experience, knowledge and insight into the history of the Arabian Peninsula, its very few routes for travel, and those locations of dwelling that Lehi and his family had



available to them when they left Jerusalem. George and his colleagues have identified several most likely travel routes, encampment sites, halts (those locations where caravans halted and resupplied), also where and how they most likely built their ship and departed for the Promised Land. The pictures he had show it is "bountiful" and lush.

LITTLE MOUNTAIN SUMMIT



All monies have been contributed to replace the plaque at the Little Mountain Summit, it has been ordered to be delivered toward the end of April, then will be announced the time of placement and rededication. Thank you to every generous member who helped with this project.



Little Mountain is the last summit in the Wasatch Mountains along the pioneer trail. From this point the trail descends Northwest until it reaches Emigration Creek. As William Clayton's "Emigrant's Guide" warns: "The

descent is very steep all the way." The Donner party passed over the summit August 21, 1846, and the Mormons on July 21, 1847. It is located 7.6 miles from the mouth of Emigration Canyon. --Utah Division of State History, Markers and Monuments Database.

Robert Pollei has been in charge of this project. Now he is busy finding other monuments needing attention.
